### Trustee Report for the Year ended December 2020

#### **Objectives and Activities**

A founding letter from Andrew Carnegie dated 1903 explains the nature and purpose of the Trust, the objects of which briefly expressed, are to add value to the lives of the people of Dunfermline and "its environs".

The Trustees seek to fulfil these objectives by:

- the development and maintenance of the Andrew Carnegie Birthplace Museum to promote the vision and legacy of Andrew Carnegie,
- a programme of grants to local organisations,
- entering into partnerships and promotion of initiatives with groups and organisations whose objects meet the same objectives as the Trust.

In addition to the principal objectives of the Trust, the Hero Fund was established in 1908 under the governance of the same body of Trustees, to recognise acts of civilian heroism and to give financial support where appropriate where the act of heroism has occurred in Great Britain, Ireland or the Channel Islands.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

The global Covid-19 pandemic had a major impact on the world as we knew it during 2020. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, the Carnegie Dunfermline and Hero Fund Trustees and staff remained committed to fulfilling their charitable aims and a great deal of positive work was achieved.

Due to the national Covid-19 lockdown, Andrew Carnegie House closed on the 23 March 2020 and all office staff and Trustees began working from home. Apart from occasional visits to Andrew Carnegie House for essential purposes, remote working continued throughout the year. This new way of working required a significant shift away from paper-based systems and communication changed from face-to-face to virtual. Video conferencing soon became the new norm and all Board meetings from April onwards were conducted via Zoom.

At the end of May, the Trust bade a fond farewell to outgoing CEO, Nora Rundell, who had led the Trust with drive and commitment for 16 years and wished her a long and happy retirement. Nora led the team through the initial challenges of the pandemic with her normal calmness and professionalism. The Trust will be forever indebted to Nora for her hard work and dedication to all things Carnegie, particularly her work in bringing the international Hero Funds together. Nora retired following a very successful centenary year where she represented the Trust with dignity at home and international events.

In early June, the Trust welcomed new CEO, Gillian Taylor, who came to the Trust from her role as Dunfermline Area Manager with Fife Council. Gillian brings experience of collaborative partnership working and an excellent knowledge of the current issues affecting Dunfermline. Gillian quickly settled into the CEO role, despite starting during a global pandemic and the Trustees wish her every success.

The Carnegie Dunfermline Trust's core grant giving objectives of alleviating poverty, improving health and wellbeing and overcoming loneliness became even more pertinent during the 2020 year of lockdown restrictions. Our traditional grant applications shifted significantly as many local clubs, organisations and charities were unable to meet and school trips and sports and cultural festivals were cancelled. Instead, the Trust adapted by providing emergency grants that helped local organisations respond to the Coronavirus crisis and supported local people in a time of need. The year ended with the Trust offering an on-line panto experience for all schools and care homes in the Dunfermline area and this brought some much-needed joy and laughter to a difficult year.

After an award winning 2019 year, the museum unfortunately had to close its doors early in the 2020 season due to the national lockdown restrictions. The museum staff quickly responded by offering a virtual museum walk through experience and by developing activity packs and digital resources for local schools to assist home-schooling parents. With some easing of restrictions, the museum reopened in August 2020 with strict hygiene measures in place and a booking system to ensure that visitor numbers were kept manageable and safe. The season ended with a family friendly event especially developed to support children with autism as 2020 had been a particularly difficult year for these families.

Due to the pandemic, there were no new Hero Fund presentations during 2020, however, two families did manage to visit Dunfermline to view the Roll of Honour entries for their loved ones. The pandemic presented challenges and anxieties for many Hero Fund beneficiaries and Liane Horder, Hero Fund Manager provided regular financial and emotional support.





In September, Trust Chair, Fiona Robertson; Hero Fund Manager, Liane Horder and CEO, Gillian Taylor participated in a memorial event in Consett, County Durham which honoured eleven men who tragically died in a steel works disaster in 1950. Our research found that nine of the men had been recognised as Carnegie Heroes and the Trust had financially supported many of the surviving families over the intervening years.

Volume four of the Roll of Honour was bound during 2020 and restorative calligraphy work was carried out to ensure that these books remain a beautiful, lasting and dignified memorial to the selfless acts of the heroes recognised by the Carnegie Hero Fund. The Andrew Carnegie statue in Pittencrieff Park was lit up in red in September, as part of a national campaign to raise awareness of the effect of the pandemic on the live events industry. The normal Remembrance Sunday event did not take place in November due to lockdown restrictions. However, the CEO, supported by a small number of Trustees laid wreaths at the war memorials to remember those who had lost their lives.

The importance of outdoor green space on health and wellbeing became obvious during 2020 and the Trust worked in partnership with Fife Council to ensure that Pittencrieff Park offered a tranquil green haven for the people of Dunfermline to enjoy and exercise in during the pandemic. This led to a new partnership group being formed to drive forward ambitions for the park and its buildings in a 21st Century context. The Trustees and Staff rounded off the year with a festive online quiz.

A special thanks must go to all the Trustees and staff who remained dedicated, resilient and adaptable throughout the challenging pandemic year.

After a fantastic 2019 season which ended with the museum winning the Kids in Museums Family Friendly Museum Award, the museum team were excited to embark upon another successful year. We started our season with a visit from the CEO of Museums Galleries Scotland, Lucy Casot, and Labour MSP, Claire Baker who congratulated our team for finally bringing this fabulous award to Scotland.

On 8 March, we brought different generations together for our International Women's Day Silent Disco Tour which saw us dancing and singing through the Pittencrieff Park and streets of Dunfermline together. Due to

the Covid-19 pandemic, the rest of 2020 turned out very different from what we all had imagined, but it was no less creative, fun and educational than usual. The museum continued to spread joy and unveil knowledge about our collections on digital platforms with our followers all around the world.

#### Institutional targets:

To share our Family Friendly Museum Award success with others, the museum's Learning Officer and Curator/ Manager gave interviews and digital presentations for various professional bodies including the International Council of Museums' Best in Heritage conference, Museums Galleries Scotland/Kids in Museums webinar and the Group for Education in Museums publication.

Despite the challenges around additional Covid-19 cleaning and hygiene measures, our team was determined to continue to meet our sustainable development targets which we managed to do with help and advice from Green Tourism. The museum also signed up for the Plastic Free Pledge, thus helping Dunfermline achieve its Plastic Free Community status.



### Helping our Community

During the lockdown months, we continued to maintain our online presence and endeavoured to make as much of our digital content accessible to people with additional support needs too (by using subtitles in videos for the hard of hearing, and photo descriptions for visually impaired).





To help families through difficult months, we started our Cheer Up Dippy Contest in April and encouraged children to write our dinosaur mascot a short letter or draw them a picture. To keep kids busy over the spring and summer holidays, digital Carnegie Creators activities were launched. The latter were also distributed in printed format through Dunfermline Food Bank and schools' resource boxes for those who have limited access to the Internet.

"All ages in our family enjoyed finding the landmarks in the HQ Explorers i-spy trail whilst on a trip around Dunfermline. My daughter is using the trail as the starting point for her Local history badge in Brownies to keep her busy before school, and hopefully Brownies, start back."

In the run-up to another lockdown our monthly Bobbin Babies and Bigs sessions were brought back in autumn and delivered live online. In addition to that, we worked in partnership with Go Dunfermline to create an Andrew Carnegie-themed digital quiz, and an i-Spy explorer trail for families which invited them to wander around the Dunfermline Heritage Quarter. To support teachers and families with learning, three online classroom resource packs were launched for primary school age kids in September, containing videos, PowerPoint slides and activity sheets.

On 10 August the museum was finally able to open its doors again and in order to celebrate the success of a group of local parents who organised the Dunfermline Superheroes charity runs during the lockdown - raising tens and thousands of pounds for children's charities - we invited them for a private visit.

In September, we became the newest library in Dunfermline by launching a Little Library service! The engagement with it has been great both online and in person, and the turnover of books is high.

With 2020 being especially difficult for families affected by autism, we were happy to welcome them back to the museum in December for our Autism Relaxed Opening. Despite additional cleaning and social distancing measures, the families felt at ease and enjoyed a variety of robotics-themed activities available for them on the day.

"Thank you for the fantastic welcome and experience at the autism friendly session! The boys had a great time and the staff were great and very happy to spend time with the kids explaining things. Great asset to Dunfermline!" Our season ended with a clothing collection for Dunfermline Children's Clothing Bank. It was heartbreaking to hear how many families were struggling due to the pandemic and we were delighted to bring our community together and help their cause.


#### Collections

The museum's collections continued to grow in 2020 with the commissioned portrait of Andrew Carnegie by Calum Colvin (RSA, OBE) being unveiled in March. The museum also received objects from private individuals, descendants of Andrew Carnegie and Carnegie institutions (namely Carnegie Hall in New York). Our Curator/Manager carried on supporting the work of academic scholars both in Scotland and abroad by answering their questions and supplying images and scans of documents in our archive. The care and guardianship for our collections remained just as important as always and in December the museum received a Collections Care Audit grant from the Association for Independent Museums, which enabled us to approach a conservator for professional advice.


## Carnegie Dunfermline Trust

The Carnegie Dunfermline Trust makes awards over four broad categories, Community; Creative Arts; Sport and Schools. In addition to these, Emergency Grants were introduced in 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

## 2020 – An Exceptional Year

### **Emergency Grants**

From mid March 2020, as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic, the government advised all organisers of mass events – indoors and outdoors - to cancel or postpone. By 24 March, the country was in lockdown with schools, pubs, restaurants, gyms and other social venues across the UK closed. The impact was felt by all businesses and organisations. Andrew Carnegie House was closed and all staff started to work from home. Grants for activities and events which were cancelled were withdrawn and the funds were used for other projects which could go ahead when restrictions were eased.

In early April, the Trust recognised that these were extraordinary times and commenced a programme of Emergency Grants (<  $\pm$ 1500) to support local organisations which had to make changes to their operational practices so that they could continue to provide a service to their clients e.g. mobile phones, laptops or other digital equipment. The programme was extended in the summer when government restrictions were relaxed and organisations started to return to former activities. At this time, small emergency grants were awarded to assist recovery e.g. to help with signage, health & safety equipment or other items needed to allow activities to re-start.



# Sports

### **Dunfermline Carnegie Hockey Club**

A grant of  $\pm 1500$  was awarded towards the costs of a training programme for the club's female hockey players, to improve the performance levels of the 1st and 2nd team squads. 2020-2021 is the centenary of the Dunfermline Ladies Club which merged with the men's club in 1999.

### Children's Clothing Bank

A start-up grant of £2500 was awarded to this new charity which aims to provide new and pre-loved clothes in a dignified manner to families in need in Dunfermline and surrounding areas, for children up to and including 18 years of age. The Trust's grant allowed for the purchase of clothes rails, ironing equipment, storage boxes and clothing and shoe vouchers.





### Hyperclub

A grant of  $\pounds$ 3000 was awarded towards alterations required to the shop front of new larger premises to create wheelchair access. This local charity, previously based in Inverkeithing supports children and adults with disabilities into accessing a more positive and active lifestyle and is relocating due to a demand for their services.

### **Schools**

### **Scottish SPCA**

A grant of £10,000 was awarded to the organisation's Magic of Nature focussed intervention programme at Woodmill High School working with up to 400 pupils who are disengaged from formal education. Through learning about nature and creating a wildlife garden and building an app and mini- website, it is hoped that the pupils will re-engage with learning, improve their mental health and wellbeing and feel more positive about their future choices. The Trust's grant allowed the purchase of laptops and specific software pre-loaded for the project.

#### **Bellyeoman Primary School**

The Trust provided a grant of £3000 towards the redevelopment of the school library, to inspire and meet the needs of the pupils. The funds were used to purchase books and better storage and display of books within the library.

#### **Inverkeithing High School**

A grant of £5000 was awarded to Inverkeithing High School to allow the school to continue with the School of Hard Knocks (SOHK) programme. This innovative, alternative curriculum programme, is tailored to tackle local challenges such as youth unemployment, low educational achievement and poor well-being of young people. The SOHK programme is delivered by a team of coaches and mentors, who visit Inverkeithing HS for one full school day per week working with the same group of pupils. In addition to classroom sessions, the pupils receive rugby coaching using a unique values-led approach to teach responsibility, resilience, leadership and teamwork. During the year, SOHK ran virtually when the pupils were not able to be in school.



#### **Carnegie Primary School**

The Trust awarded a grant of £1500 towards a Munro Challenge experience for P7 pupil's run by outreach workers from Ardroy residential centre. The pupils undertook a training day at West Lomond before completing their challenge in the Ochils.

The Munro Challenge also contributes to the John Muir Award which pupils undertake during their final year at primary school.

#### **P7** Project prizes

Every year the Trust provides book tokens to be awarded as prizes for P7 leavers. The awards are made at the discretion of school staff. 2020 provided a few challenges as schools were in lockdown at the end of the summer term, when 'leavers' assemblies take place, but prizes were presented either in the school playground or delivered directly to the winners by school staff.

#### **Online pantomime**

The Trustees agreed a grant of up to £5925 to allow local schools and care homes to download an online pantomime so that pupils and residents could enjoy a festive treat. Once paid for and downloaded, the panto could be watched as many times as necessary in 'bubbles' between given dates.

### Heroism

During 2020, the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust UK was unable to recognise anyone, however, there were 11 further cases of heroism under investigation.

### **Presentations**

The Hero Fund were unable to arrange any presentations in the year under review due to the ongoing pandemic. We hope that restrictions will allow us to hold presentations in 2021.

### **Visitors to Dunfermline**

It is always lovely to welcome Hero Fund friends to Dunfermline, however unfortunately due to the Covid-19 pandemic and the ever changing restrictions, we were only able to arrange two visits over the year.

Our first visitor was Kieran Kelly and his friend. They visited Andrew Carnegie House in January to see the Roll of Honour entry for his uncle, Patrick Kelly, who lost his life in 1960 while attempting to rescue a drowning child.





#### **Consett Iron Works Memorial**



On 12th September, with strict social-distancing measures in place, a memorial was unveiled at Consett Iron Works, County Durham in honour of the men who lost their lives at the works. In particular, the ceremony acknowledged the eleven men who died during the disaster in 1950. Carnegie Hero Fund Trust recognised nine of these eleven men who lost their lives attempting to rescue the other two.



Representatives from each of the families of the Carnegie Heroes attended along with local Councillors, the MP, members of Project Genesis Trust and the local press.

Our Chair, Fiona Robertson; CEO, Gillian Taylor and Hero Fund Manager, Liane Horder were in attendance, with Fiona giving a speech about Andrew Carnegie and the Hero Fund and Liane reading out the citation. There is a link between our current Chair, Fiona Robertson and the Trusts Chair at the time when these heroes were recognised (W. B. Robertson, pictured above left) as he was Fiona's Grandfather-in-Law.

#### Volume IV of the Roll of Honour

In 2020 the fourth volume of the Roll of Honour was bound by RDW Book and Paper Conservation Ltd, Falkirk who also bound the third volume in 1996. The calligraphy of the title page was also completed in 2020.

The Hero Fund's calligrapher, Annette Reed, has chosen a design that reflects the calligraphy in the original volume, using gold leaf and the laurel wreath design.

We received around 30 requests this year, for information about cases from past years and 4 replacement certificate orders.


#### **Enquiries**

To make enquiries about a case from the past, please contact the Trust with the following information:

- name of person whose heroism was recognised by the Hero Fund
- your relationship to them
- date, place and nature of the incident which took place and any further details known to you
- state if you have a copy of the certificate
- if not, state how you found out about the award

The Trustees will endeavour to provide as much assistance as they can in answering queries but reserve the right to only release such information as is available or appropriate to the enquiry.

The Roll of Honour is kept in the Birthplace Museum, where the first volume is on constant display. Individual requests regarding viewing of specific entries are subject to the same procedure as above.




### Citation

At 11am on 20 November 2018 Stephen was driving on the A20 near Swanley in Kent. Driving conditions were very bad with hail, sleet and torrential rain affecting visibility and causing an excess of water on the road. A number of cars aquaplaned and left the road with one flipping over onto its roof with the driver trapped inside.

On witnessing this accident, Stephen pulled over to help, as did one other vehicle. Despite the worsening weather conditions and with vehicles driving past at motorway speeds Stephen along with the occupants of the other vehicle went to the aid of the driver in the overturned car. They had just managed to free the trapped man when another vehicle aquaplaned, spun out of control and careered into them, killing Stephen and one other man.

The heroism of Stephen Ball has been recognised as falling within the scope of the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust. His name will be inscribed in the Roll of Honour; his family will receive a posthumous certificate and the Trustees will maintain a continuing interest in their welfare.




### Citation

At 11am on 20 November 2018 Raymond was driving on the A20 near Swanley in Kent with his work colleague. Driving conditions were very bad with hail, sleet and torrential rain affecting visibility and causing an excess of water on the road. A number of cars aquaplaned and left the road with one flipping over onto its roof with the driver trapped inside.

Raymond pulled over along with one other vehicle. Both he, his colleague and the occupant of the other vehicle got out of their vehicles to help. Despite the worsening weather conditions and with vehicles driving past at motorway speeds Raymond and the others went to the aid of the driver in the overturned car. They had just managed to free the trapped man from his car when another vehicle, which was out of control, careered into them, killing Raymond and one other man.


The heroism of Raymond Bridges has been recognised as falling within the scope of the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust. His name will be inscribed in the Roll of Honour; his family will receive a posthumous certificate and the Trustees will maintain a continuing interest in their welfare.



### Citation

On the evening of the 3 June 2017, three terrorists ploughed a van into pedestrians on London Bridge before launching a knife attack on members of the public in Borough Market. Kirsty Boden had been enjoying a night out when it became apparent that there had been a terrible incident on London Bridge. People ran into shops, cafes and restaurants, Kirsty without hesitation went to assist those injured in the courtyard area below the bridge. As she was trying to save the life of an injured person she was attacked by the terrorists and was fatally wounded.

The heroism of Kirsty Boden has been recognised as falling within the scope of the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust. Her name will be inscribed in the Roll of Honour and a posthumous certificate will be presented to her family if desired. The Trustees will maintain a continuing interest in their welfare.



### Citation

At 2.40 in the afternoon of 22 March 2017 a terrorist drove his vehicle into pedestrians on Westminster Bridge, London. Kurt and his wife, Melissa, who were on the final day of a trip to London to celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary, were walking across the bridge. Kurt saw the car coming towards them. He immediately took decisive action to protect Melissa and pushed her as far as possible away from the path of the oncoming car thus saving her life. He was struck by the car and was fatally injured.

The heroism of Kurt Cochran has been recognised as falling within the scope of the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust. His name will be inscribed in the Roll of Honour and a posthumous certificate will be presented to his family if desired. The Trustees will maintain a continuing interest in their welfare.



### Citation

On the evening of 3 June 2017, Ignacio Echeverria was cycling through Borough Market with friends when he witnessed a terrorist attack. On realising what was happening, he ran towards the terrorists, using his skateboard to strike them and to prevent them from carrying out further attacks. He challenged multiple armed terrorists aware that his skateboard was no match for their weapons. He ran towards them with the intention of stopping them from carrying out further attacks on innocent people who were in the vicinity. The terrorists diverted their attention to him and inflicted fatal wounds. It is without a doubt that his intervention allowed victims to escape, thus preventing further loss of life.

The heroism of Ignacio Echeverria has been recognised as falling within the scope of the Carnegie Hero Fund Trust. His name will be inscribed in the Roll of Honour and a posthumous certificate will be presented to his family if desired. The Trustees will maintain a continuing interest in their welfare.

### The Trust's Work

### General Principles Applied to Reported Acts of Heroism

- 1. The purpose of the Carnegie Hero Fund UK is to recognise acts of civilian heroism by those over the age of eighteen, and give financial assistance and support, if necessary, to:
  - (i) the dependants of persons who have died,
  - (ii) persons who have been injured, and
  - (iii) who have incurred appreciable financial loss through performing acts of heroism in peaceful pursuits.
- 2. The act of heroism must have occurred in Great Britain, Ireland, the Channel Islands, or in the surrounding territorial waters.
- 3. Heroic acts performed in the saving of property are not recognised as falling within the scope of the Trust, which extends only to the saving or attempted saving of human life.
- 4. The heroic act must have been voluntary and have involved risk to the rescuer's life. In some occupations the ordinary discharge of duty involves risks, and such risks cannot in general be regarded as voluntary; but once the ordinary requirements of duty have been exceeded a case is eligible for consideration.
- 5. The Trustees are prepared to consider cases in which death, injury, or appreciable financial loss is sustained where the nature of the rescue effort outweighs any burden of responsibility.
- 6. Presentation of a potential case for consideration by the Trustees should be accompanied by a report/ statement from a member of the emergency services confirming that the rescue/attempted rescue involved risk to the rescuer's life. Recognition of a case is at the sole discretion of the Trustees.

#### Notes

Each reported case of heroism is judged on its individual merit in accordance with these General Principles. On recognising a case as falling within their scope, the Trustees will award a certificate and make such financial provision as they may think necessary. The name of the hero or heroine will be inscribed in the Trust's Roll of Honour and the Trustees will maintain a continuing interest in the welfare of the person recognised and/or their family.

The level of financial provision to beneficiaries should be assessed and made on the basis of the ongoing needs of beneficiaries.
